See how easy it is to create your own fun and wacky sock puppets!

Materials Needed:

- 2 colorful socks
- Pre-made curly ribbon bows
- 2 pair of eyes (available at craft stores)
- Colored pompoms
- Low Temp glue gun



Step 1 Put hand in sock to create puppet shape. Push in toe area to create mouth.

Step 2 Glues eyeballs, and pompom nose into place.

Step 3 Glue curly ribbon into place at heel of sock which is now the top of the puppet head.

Step 4 Make a friend for your new sock puppet!
