



Jules Cheret's colorful posters adorned the streets of Paris in the late 1800s. The Milwaukee Art Museum featured the very first solo exhibition of his work in the United States.



The Milwaukee Art Museum is an architectural landmark. Designed by Spanish architect, Santiago Calatrava.

The 217' wingspan feature unfolds and folds twice daily.

In the late 1800's the streets of Paris were lined with tall cylindrical columns that were covered with advertisement posters.

The posters were so popular, people would often remove them to take home and enjoy!



Attention to detail is very important



when exhibitions are designed by museum staff members. Often a scale model of the gallery space is made to help in the process of laying out a successful exhibition.
