Each flag represents a letter of the alphabet and a corresponding word. It's a universally recognized...



Make your own Fleet of Sailboats!

Materials Needed:

- Small Sponges
- Popsicle Sticks
- Heavy Paper
- Scissors



Step 2 Cut a piece of construction paper into a small rectangle, square or triangular shape for the sail.

Step 3 Cut a small horizontal slit on the top and bottom

of the paper and carefully slide onto the popsicle stick 'mast'.
